

Touch Typing

Typing programmes Using IT effectively is a key life skill. It is particularly useful for children with special needs. However, it requires a number of key skills.

To use ICT effectively, particularly with a view to recording work in a classroom as an alternative to writing, a child needs to be able to understand how to save, file and find their work effectively and independently. This means that practicing typing skills is a really good activity. There are lots of online programmes to help children learn to type correctly and quickly.

Children need to know how to:

- Link upper- and lower-case letters
- Find letters on the keyboard proficiently
- Manipulate their fingers to land on the correct keys quickly
